Christkind or Kris Kringle was believed to deliver presents to well-behaved Swiss and German children. Meaning "Christ child," Christkind is an angel-like figure often accompanied by St. Nicholas on his holiday missions. A few other names for Santa are Father Christmas in English, Pere Noel fills gifts in the shoes of French children, in Italy La Befana delivers toys into the stockings of lucky children. Let's not forget my favorite Santa, Gaghant Baba, (which translates to 'Winter Father/ Grandfather') who visits the Armenian children on January 6.



LEGISLATIVE ANALYSIS

Following are bills signed by Governor Gavin Newsom in late September and October:

AB223 – Change of gender and sex identifier – Assemblymember Chris Ward (D)

This bill requires all courts in California to keep sex or gender changes by minors confidential. With this new law, only minors who petition to change their sex or gender on government documents can access such court information, along with their parents or guardians, and their attorneys. The bill also states that for minors to change their gender and sex identifier to male, female, or nonbinary, the court will recognize such changes if the child submits a simple affidavit stating their new sex and gender. The court will then be required to issue the child new documents including a birth certificate to reflect such changes.

AB33 – Fentanyl Misuse and Overdose Prevention Task Force – Assemblymember Jasmeet Bains (D)

This bill, subject to an appropriation, establishes the Fentanyl Misuse and Overdose Prevention Task Force to undertake various duties relating to fentanyl misuse, including, among others, collecting and organizing data on the nature and extent of fentanyl misuse in California and evaluating approaches to increase public awareness of fentanyl misuse. The bill requires the task force to be cochaired by the Attorney General and the State Public Health Officer, or their designees, and specifies

the membership of the task force. The bill requires the first meeting of the task force to take place no later than June 1, 2024, and requires the task force to meet at least once every two months. The bill requires the task force to submit an interim report to the Governor and the Legislature by July 1, 2025, and to report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature by December 1, 2025. The bill repeals these provisions on January 1, 2026. (Two years to report on the MISUSE and overdose prevention of the highly addictive and deadly drug FENTANYL!)

SB669 – Veterinarians: veterinarian-client-patient relationship – Senator Dave Cortese (D)

Existing law, the Veterinary Medicine Practice Act, establishes the Veterinary Medical Board within the Department of Consumer Affairs for the licensure and regulation of veterinarians and the practice of veterinary medicine. The act prohibits any person from practicing veterinary medicine, as defined, without a license. Existing law makes a violation of the act a crime. This bill authorizes a veterinarian to allow a registered veterinary technician to act as an agent of the veterinarian for the purpose of establishing the veterinarian-client-patient relationship to administer preventive or prophylactic vaccines or medications for the control or eradication of apparent or anticipated internal or external parasites by satisfying specified criteria.

The California State Legislature has adjourned until January 3, 2024

AMERICANISM Reflecting on Bill of Rights Day

Bill of Rights Day honors the ratification of the first ten amendments to the US Constitution, which occurred on December 15, 1791. These laws protect many of American's most basic rights and precious freedoms, and are as follows in their original form.

Amendment I: Freedom of religion, speech, and the press; rights of assembly and petition. Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Amendment II: Right to bear arms. A well-regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

Amendment III: Housing of soldiers. No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Amendment IV: Search and arrest warrants. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Amendment V: Rights in criminal cases. No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy

of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

Amendment VI: Rights to a fair trial. In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

Amendment VII: Rights in civil cases. In Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Amendment VIII: Bails, fines, and punishments. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Amendment IX: Rights retained by the people. The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Amendment X: Powers retained by the states and the people. The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

THE LEGEND OF ST. NICHOLAS: The Real Santa Claus
