Major General Thomas "Tav" Taverney, USAF (Ret.)

Major General Taverney graduated from the Air Force Academy in 1968. During his active duty years, he worked on space systems acquisition, on-orbit satellite operations, space launch and during Iraqi Freedom, as a Director of Space Forces. He was the designer of the Air Force Airborne Anti-Satelite weapon (ASAT), for which he received the Air Force Scientific Achievement Award. He retired from the Air Force in 2006 as the Vice Commander of Air Force Space Command, the precursor of the U.S. Space Force. During his Air Force Reserve years and post-Air Force service, he has managed and led the design, development, and deployment in space of numerous

space payloads. Major General Taverney continues to be a vocal advocate across many areas of the United States Space Missions, serving on advisory boards and publishing numerous articles in defense and aerospace industry journals. Major General Taverney has received a variety of awards; the most meaningful to him are the Werner von Braun award for Space Program Management Excellence and the General Bernard Schriever Lifetime Achievement award. In 2016 he was inducted into the Air Force Space Hall of Fame and received the Air Force Space and Missile Pioneers Award.

LEGISLATIVE ANALYSIS

<u>SB1280</u>, as introduced, Waste management: propane cylinders: reusable or refillable (Senator Laird – D) This bill would, on and after an unspecified date, prohibit the sale or offer for sale of propane cylinders other than those propane cylinders that are reusable or refillable, as defined, and would make the violation of this provision subject to specified civil penalties.

Status: Hearing set for April 15

SB1253, as introduced, Firearms: firearm safety certificates (Senator Gonzalez – D)

This bill would, commencing on January 1, 2026, prohibit a person from possessing a firearm without the possession of a valid, unexpired firearm safety certificate. A violation of this prohibition would be punishable as a misdemeanor.

Status: Amended in Senate on April 3

<u>AB2751</u>, as amended, Employer communications during nonworking hours (Assemblymember Haney – D)

This bill would require a public or private employer to establish a workplace policy that provides employees the right to disconnect from communications from the employer during nonworking hours, except as specified. The bill would require nonworking hours to be established by written agreement between an employer and employee. The bill would authorize an employee to file a complaint of a pattern of violation of the bill's provisions with the Labor Commissioner, punishable by a specified civil penalty.

Status: Referred to Assembly Committee on Labor and Employment on April 1

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



10 facts about the Guards of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery symbolizes all war dead throughout US history whose remains have not been found or identified. The Tomb began in 1921 with an unknown soldier from World War I who lies beneath the large, white marble sarcophagus. Two crypts of unidentified service members from World War II and the Korean War were later added, and a third empty crypt represents all missing service members from the Vietnam War.

Beginning in 1926, soldiers were assigned to guard the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier to prevent any desecration or disrespect toward the tomb such as climbing or stepping on it. In 1937, the Guards became a 24/7 presence.

Guard of Honor soldiers volunteer to serve in the Army, in the 3rd US Infantry Regiment and as Tomb Guards. They are handpicked and go through rigorous training, although the majority of those who begin Tomb Guard training are unable to meet the high standards. Here are ten interesting facts about the Tomb Guards:

- Each guard must be able to flawlessly perform seven different types of walks, honors and ceremonies. They must retain vast amounts of knowledge concerning the Tomb, Arlington National Cemetery, the United States Army and their unit, including the identity of the 175 notable people buried at the cemetery and the location of their internment.
- 2. There are three Reliefs assigned to the Tomb Guard Platoon, and the heights are equal on each Relief, with the tallest assigned to the 1st Relief

- (6'2" to 6'4"), then the 2nd (6' to 6'2"), and the 3rd (5'11" to 6').
- 3. The guards hold no rank because the unidentified soldiers are unknown and it would be inappropriate for them to be guarded by someone who outranks them.
- 4. The guards continue their post throughout heat waves, blizzards, hurricanes, rain, sleet, snow and hail. In 2003 in anticipation of Hurricane Isabel, the US Senate and House took two days off. Although given permission to do so, the guards refused to suspend their assignment.
- 5. Out of respect for the dead, the guards carry their rifles on their outside shoulder, away from the tomb.
- 6. The guards are changed every 30 minutes during summer and winter. During closing hours, the guard is changed every two hours.
- 7. The guards march 21 steps down the black mat behind the tomb, turn, face east for 21 seconds, turn and face north for 21 seconds, then take 21 steps down the mat, then repeat the process. This symbolizes the twenty-one-gun-salute, the highest honor given to any military or foreign dignitary.
- 8. Guards are not permitted to speak or break step unless someone enters the restricted area around the tomb.
- 9. The average length of duty for guards is 18 months.
- 10. The guards' gloves are wet to prevent losing a grip on their rifles.



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ARMED FORCES DAY



The first Armed Forces Day was held on May 20, 1950. The Purpose of this day was to unite the various military bodies of the United States under the Department of Defense. This day is also used to help educate civilians on different matters and to support the troops defending this country and its freedom. According to the Department of Defense, originally, Armed Forces Day was a type of "educational"

program for civilians," one in which there would be an increased awareness of the Armed Forces. It was designed to expand public understanding of what type of job is performed and the role of the military in civilian life. It was a day for the military to show "state-of-the-art" equipment to the civilian population they were protecting. And it was a day to honor and acknowledge all who currently serve and all who have served, both active and former, in the reserves, National Guard or on active duty. The National Security Act of 1947 reads, "The term 'Armed Forces' means Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard."
